### 4. The Thirteen Colonies (1607-1750)

• Deep dive into the founding of Jamestown, Plymouth, and the development of the 13 British colonies.

### 5. Life in Colonial America (1700-1750)

• Social, economic, and cultural life in the colonies, including the rise of slavery and indentured servitude.

### 6. The French and Indian War (1754-1763)

• The causes, major events, and outcomes of the war, and how it set the stage for American independence.

# 7. Road to Revolution (1763-1775)

• Analyze the causes of the American Revolution, including the Stamp Act, Boston Massacre, and Intolerable Acts.

# 8. The American Revolution (1775-1783)

• Key battles, leaders, and the Declaration of Independence.

# 9. The Articles of Confederation and the Constitution (1781-1789)

• A look at the weaknesses of the Articles and the creation of the US Constitution.

# 10. The Early Republic (1789-1800)

• The presidencies of George Washington and John Adams, and the challenges of a new nation.

# 11. The Jeffersonian Era (1800-1816)

• The Louisiana Purchase, Lewis and Clark Expedition, and the War of 1812.

### 12. The Era of Good Feelings and Monroe Doctrine (1816-1824)

• A period of national unity and the impact of the Monroe Doctrine on US foreign policy.

# 13. Jacksonian Democracy and Native American Policy (1824-1840)

• Andrew Jackson's presidency, including the Trail of Tears and the rise of populism.

# 14. Westward Expansion and Manifest Destiny (1840-1850)

• The ideology of Manifest Destiny, the Oregon Trail, and the annexation of Texas.

### 15. The Mexican American War (1846-1848)

• Causes and consequences, including the acquisition of new territories.

### 16. The Pre-Civil War Era (1850-1860)

• The Compromise of 1850, Dred Scott decision, John Brown's raid, and the increasing tensions between North and South.
