

Homework Assignment: Write a Blog Post as a Journalist in the 1850s

Instructions:

Use **ChatGPT** as your assistant to brainstorm ideas, develop your article, or polish your writing. Here's how:

Step 1: Pick Your Topic

Choose one of the following events to report on:

1. **John Brown's Raid on Harpers Ferry (1859)**
 2. **The Dred Scott Decision (1857)**
 3. **"Bleeding Kansas" (1854–1859)**
 4. **The Fugitive Slave Act (1850)**
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Step 2: Brainstorm with ChatGPT

Ask ChatGPT for help brainstorming! Here are some prompt ideas to get you started:

- "Explain the key events of [your chosen topic] in simple terms."
 - "What were the Northern and Southern perspectives on [topic]?"
 - "Help me write an attention-grabbing headline about [topic]."

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Step 3: Write Your Blog Post

- **Include a Perspective:** Take on the viewpoint of a Northern abolitionist, a Southern planter, or a neutral observer. Use persuasive language to support your stance. Try asking, “How would a [perspective] describe [topic]?”
- **Add Quotes or Reactions:** Create imagined quotes to bring your article to life. Use prompts like:
 - “Write a quote from an abolitionist reacting to the Dred Scott decision.”
 - “How might a Southern planter have responded to John Brown’s raid?”

4. **Conclusion (2–3 sentences):**

- Reflect on the significance of the event. End with a thought-provoking question or statement about the future. Try asking, “What were the long-term effects of [topic] on the nation?”

Step 4: Add a Visual Aid

Include a visual aid to enhance your blog post. Your visual could be:

- A **political cartoon** (use ChatGPT to brainstorm ideas, e.g., “What would a political cartoon about [topic] look like?”).
- A **map** showing where the event took place or the territories affected.
