Trailblazers' Homework Assignment: Podcast Episode on a Human Story from the Mexican-American War

Objective:

For this podcast episode, we're diving into the Mexican-American War (1846–1848), but with a twist! Instead of focusing on famous generals or political leaders, your mission is to spotlight the story of a lesser-known individual who was impacted by the war. Bonus points if they're a foreigner, a minority, or a woman—voices we don't often hear in the history books. Use **Soundtrap** to record and produce your podcast like a pro!

Instructions:

1. Research Your Person

- o Find a real person whose life was affected by the Mexican-American War. Look for:
 - Someone from an underrepresented group, like women, Native Americans, or Mexican civilians.
 - Foreigners involved in the war, such as Irish immigrants or soldiers from the Saint Patrick's Battalion.
 - Anyone whose story highlights a unique perspective on the war's impact.

2. Learn Their Story

- Gather information about:
 - Who they were: What's their background, role, or situation?
 - How the war affected them: Consider personal, political, social, or economic impacts.
 - Why their story matters: What does their experience reveal about the larger impact of the war?

3. Plan Your Podcast Episode

- o Draft an outline that includes:
 - **Introduction**: Hook your audience with why this person's story is compelling.
 - **Main Content**: Share their story in detail, weaving in context from the Mexican-American War.
 - **Reflection**: Discuss the broader themes their story connects to and why it's significant today.
 - **Outro**: Wrap up with a call to action or thought-provoking question for your audience.

4. Record Your Episode Using Soundtrap

- o Log in to **Soundtrap**: Use this online tool to record and produce your episode.
- Record your voice in segments to make editing easier (e.g., intro, main content, outro).
- o Add music and sound effects using Soundtrap's built-in library. For example:
 - Period-appropriate music for atmosphere.
 - Sound effects like battle sounds or ambient noises for immersion.

o Use editing tools to clean up audio, balance levels, and create a polished episode.

5. Consider Diverse Perspectives

 Use this opportunity to amplify voices that are often overlooked in traditional narratives of history.
